"Sammy" got a second chance because of your help and caring.


Each year we strive to help as many animals as possible to find their new lives. We give them the medical care and nutrition they need to become their best selves. We can do this because of you.

All things considered he has adjusted life at the shelter pretty well. He made new friends with the shelter staff and volunteers along with the other four-legged residents. Our animals all go through a tough time. They were somewhere else and now they are here. Their world is topsy turvy. We do everything we can to assure them it will be ok.

Bubba is medically cleared and will get neutered and have his teeth cleaned. Time for Bubba's new forever family to find him. He won't be an orphan much longer. This is what we do.

# An Emergency Case: "Thom" The Kitten


















### Tansy The Tabby: Homeless and Injured

The majority of the cat and kitten intakes are strays. "Tansy" arrived at MHS as a stray. She needed medical care because of a deep puncture near her chest cavity. Initial exam showed wound granulation tissue, which meant the body was healing itself. Antibiotics were prescribed to fight any infection brewing and pain medication to help ease the discomfort.

It's been several weeks and our staff has done an amazing job caring for Tansy. Shredded paper for litter, antibiotics every 12 hours, and check-ups every several days. Tansy's wound did eventually needed suturing to speed the body's healing process. She enjoys her soft canned food, daily petting, and soft blankets on her Kuranda cat bed while she is recovering. Once she has been cleared by veterinary staff, she will be spayed and available for adoption!

This past year we completed the enlargement of the Vet Clinic. With the addition of Christina Suchecki, our licensed Veterinary Technician, we are now able to provide enhanced vet services 5 days a week to people who would not otherwise be able to afford care for their pets.

The spay/neuter Clinics have meant a greatly reduced stray pet population and better health for all our animals.


